Lesson

Summary:

Before we came to earth we lived with Heavenly Father. Because we are here on earth we know that we chose to follow Heavenly Father's plan and not Satan. Satan wanted to take away our agency that allows us to choose between right and wrong. Heavenly Father knew that choosing for ourselves would make us stronger. Choosing the right is not always easy. Heavenly Father knew that sometimes we all would make wrong choices that could keep us from returning to live with Him. Heavenly Father's plan included a Savior who would be willing to atone for our sins. We can receive forgiveness if we repent.

Jesus Christ is our Savior. In the Garden of Gethsemane, He took upon himself all of our sins. He offers us the gift of eternal life with Him and our families if we repent and follow Him. To pay the price for our sins, Jesus suffered in the Garden of Gethsemane and upon the cross at Calvary. His suffering was so great that He bled from every pore. If we believe in Him and repent of our sins, we will not have to suffer like He did and we can return to live with Him and Heavenly Father forever.

Points to Ponder:

What did Heavenly Father's plan provide so that we can return to live with him? (A savior who would be willing to atone for our sins. We can receive forgiveness if we repent.)

What is the best birthday present you've ever received? (Let children talk about their favorite gift. Discuss how wonderful these gifts are, but they are not eternal gifts.)

What is the greatest gift of all? (The atonement of Jesus Christ.)

How does the gift of the atonement work for each of us? (Discuss ideas.)

What would have happened if we had our agency, but not a savior? (Discuss ideas.)

If Jesus suffered for our sins, why do we still have to repent? (Discuss ideas.)

Why is the atonement not only important to us individually but as a family? (Discuss ideas.)

How is the Passover lamb symbolic of the Savior? (Discuss ideas.)

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Approximate time: 20 minutes

What you need: A copy of the "Lamb of God" activity (artwork included with this lesson), scissors,

tape, cotton balls, ribbon, and scriptures.

Preparation 1. Print out the artwork.

2. Cut along black solid lines.

3. Glue part "A" to part "B".

1. Do you know an animal that is symbolic with Jesus? (Lamb.)

2. Let's learn some of the reasons why, as we make a craft.

3. Have children glue cotton balls around the edge of the white lamb shape on part "A" while you read Ex. 12:21-23. (See image for proper placement.)

What was sacrificed to save the children of Israel? (A lamb.)

4. Glue the ears on part "A" while you read Ex.12:5. What does it mean "without blemish"? (Discuss what "without blemish" means.) Note: Curl ears.

5. Glue the face on part "A". Was the sacrificial lamb a boy or girl? (Boy.)

6. Glue the eyes on part "A" while you read Ex. 12:46. What did the Lord say not to break on the lamb? (bones.)

7. Glue the nose/mouth on part "A". What do we know about the sacrificial lamb? (It was the blood of male lambs, without blemish and no broken bones, that saved the children of Israel.)

8. Glue the scripture on part "A".

10. Glue cotton balls around the edge of the white cloud shape on part "B" while you read Cor. 5:7. Who was sacrificed to save us from sin and death? (Christ.)

10. Glue Christ on part "B" while you read Peter 1:18-19. How is the blood of Christ like the blood of the lamb put on the children of Israel's doors? (We are "redeemed" from death and sin by the blood of Christ.)

11. Read 1 Ne. 12:6 while you glue the scripture on part "B".


12. Thread a piece of ribbon through the hole in the top while you read John 19:36.

13. End with words from John P. Pratt, Ensign, Jul 1985, "The Passover feast centered on the paschal lamb, which was a sacrificial lamb, a male without blemish and with no broken bone, even after death. Likewise, Jesus was the 'Passover,' the 'Lamb of God', a male without blemish and with no broken bone, even after death. He was the Firstborn of God in the pre-mortal existence (D&C 93:21), sanctified in the flesh as were the firstborn of Israel, and slain even as were the firstborn of Egypt (Ex. 12:29)."


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




Red Velvet Lamb Cakes

Cupcake Ingredients

1 cup sugar

1/2 cup soft butter

1 egg

1 tablespoons cocoa powder

1 Tbs. red food coloring

1 1/4 cups cake flour

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 cup buttermilk

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1/2 teaspoon baking soda

1/2 tablespoon vinegar



Cream Cheese Frosting & Decorating Ingredients

4 ounces cream cheese

1/4 cup butter


1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

2 cup powdered sugar

156 miniature marshmallows

3 regular marshmallows for ears

9 black or jelly beans for eyes/noses



Cup Cakes: Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Line a (12 cup) muffin tin with cupcake papers. Cream the sugar, butter and egg. Mix cocoa and food coloring together and then add to sugar mixture; mix well. Sift together flour and salt. Add flour mixture to the creamed mixture alternately with buttermilk. In a small bowl, combine baking soda, vinegar and vanilla; blend into mixture. Fill muffin cups 3/4 full with batter. Bake for 20 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean. Cool completely before frosting with cream cheese frosting.

Frosting: Blend cream cheese and butter until smooth. Beat in vanilla and powdered sugar until creamy.

Treat Time: Give each family member a FROSTED cupcake to decorate. See image for placement of jelly beans and marshmallows to make lamb faces.
